Hello everyone,

It seems a long time since I last wrote a letter for everyone. We are well into 2025 now. The Christmas decorations are long gone but are those of you who had real Christmas trees still finding pine needles? At the start of February (on the 2nd) some Christians celebrate Candlemas. Candlemas Day is one of the oldest feast days celebrated since the 4th century A.D. It comes exactly 40 days after Christmas and is the time we remember when Jesus was presented at the temple in Jerusalem by Mary and Joseph.

Simeon was promised, through revelation by the Holy Spirit, that he wouldn't die until he had seen the Messiah. In obedience to the Spirit's leading he went into the temple courts that same day as Mary, Joseph and Jesus. How must he have felt? Well apparently he was so joyful he told God he would now die happy.

10.30am at Lancaster Road URC (church lounge)





I didn't find those elusive grape hyacinths, but Tuscany has certainly left another lasting impression on my mind.

I loved the sounds of the nearby stream and the goats' bells. I loved the natural surroundings, the mountains, the wildlife, the tranquility and peacefulness of the days and our log fires in the evenings. A perfect retreat away from hustle and bustle. Above all, for me, every experience is a bonus. I thank God every morning that I am alive, and that He is with me.

# My European Extravaganza, Part Two

After travelling so many miles, or perhaps I should say kilometres, in a British style van from Enfield, to France, to Switzerland, to Italy, over the previous three days, Emma, Roxy and I made a mere five-minute drive from Emma and Sam's house to Osnago. Having just adjusted to being a passenger in a right-hand drive van, I now had to adjust to a European style left hand drive car. (Thankfully Emma is used to both, and adapts rapidly to the vehicles and the road layouts).

We enjoyed a varied and then very steep and rugged walk up to Montevecchia alta. At the very top is a prominent church which being so high up can be seen as a landmark for miles around. I had been looking forward to seeing inside some Italian churches but unfortunately this one was locked. However, we explored the very Italian looking, and at that time, tranquil village, being the only folk around. Returning to Osnago I encouraged Emma to let Roxy off her lead to practice 'recall'. This she did, and I discovered very soon just how good Roxy was at returning to us! Roxy careered full tilt at a gallop towards us! Emma nimbly dodged out of her way, but I landed in a crumpled heap on the ground entangled with a very large, heavy, shaggy, boisterous and rather damp dog! Fortunately, no permanent damage done, but I did keep well out of her way with further recalls!

The following day, after walking Roxy, Emma and I set off again. This time, bound for a three-night stay in a mountainous area of Tuscany. This was a region I had read about at school concerning beautiful grape hyacinth plants and it had left a long-lasting impression on my mind.
